

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

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Maria Elisete Almeida got her Ph.D. in Romance Linguistics, at Grenoble (France), in 1993. She was Head of the Romance Studies Department for two mandates and Vice-Dean (2 mandates). She co-organised (with Prof. Michel Maillard) The International Conference in Funchal - *O Género nas Línguas, Culturas e Literaturas*. Currently, she is both Head of the Research Centre, METAGRAM, and of The Masters Degree Programme, Portuguese Language and Literature Teaching. She has supervised several dissertations and took part in more than thirty viva assessment panels (be it as head, internal or external examiner or even supervisor), some of which for the ranks of associate professor and aggregation. She has published more than thirty papers and books in the country and abroad, e.g. Almeida, M.E. (2000). *La Deixis en Français et en Portugais*. Louvain/ Paris: Éditions Peeters. At present she is Associate Professor with both Aggregation and tenure at The Centre of Competence of Arts and Humanities of the University of Madeira.

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Dr **Gabriel Bărbuleț**'s activity spans three major research fields: semantics, pragmatics and sociolinguistics. Several of his publications include sociolinguistic approaches to topics related to the usage of slang in various socio-cultural contexts, slang in everyday language, slang in movies, slang in prison movies. His most recent are focused on these domains. Among his most recent articles we mention: *Approaching slang through style*, *Movie talk: Slang and Conversational Analysis in Prison Movies*, *Why do people use slang*. He is currently Head of the Philology Department at the Faculty of History and Philology.

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Alina-Andreea Dragoescu (born 1982) was awarded a PhD in Philology by the University of the West in Timișoara (Romania) for a doctoral thesis in Cultural Studies regarding the deconstruction of American dream mythology. She is a qualified EFL teacher at Banat's University of Agricultural Sciences and Veterinary Medicine in Timisoara (Romania) and has been teaching languages for 9 years. Her major interests are in the field of conceptual metaphor, contrastive and cognitive linguistics, and her expertise includes several areas of ESP. The latter have also provided topics for three university textbooks *How to Write a Scientific Paper*, *English for Genetic Engineers* and *English for Farm Managers*, as well as a number of published papers. She has been a co-organiser of the international conference on language education at the BUASVM in Timișoara.

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Grigore-Dan Iordăchescu, Doctor of Education (2012) from “Ion Creanga” Pedagogical State University, Moldova, with a thesis on teachers’ educational autonomy competence, currently teaches Pedagogy, Class Management and Comparative Education at the Faculty of Law and Social Sciences. His interests include pre-service and in-service teacher education and the subtler psycho-social dimension of continuing professional development of teachers.

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Teodora Popescu, Doctor of Education (2004), teaches ELT Methodology (pre- and in-service teacher training), English Semantics, Translation Studies and

Her fields of academic interests comprise translation studies, contrastive and corpus linguistics, intercultural communication.

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Her research interests include, besides the linguistics/literature interface and language and identity issues, discourse analysis, pragmatics, stylistics and critical and creative reading on which she has published several articles, book chapters and reviews in national and international journals. She has also been involved with the use of corpus linguistics in the analysis of specialized corpora (business, tourism and urban planning) and exploratory data (questionnaires).

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Sonja ŠPADIJER teaches French as a Foreign Language and is a doctoral student at the University of Montenegro. Her main areas of interest are linguistics and its applied branches: interdisciplinary connections between linguistics, literature, translation and the didactics of French. She has published in specialised journals in France, Slovakia, Montenegro and Romania. She currently participates in the programme Basileus, as part of interuniversity cooperation between the Sophia Antipolis University of Nice and the University of Montenegro. She has translated several books from French into Montenegrin, such as: *Le Portfolio européen des langues*, Little D. and R. Perclova, *L'Occupation des sols*, novel by J. Echenoz, a chapter from *La Grande Encyclopedie Larousse*. As part of collaboration with the Ministry of Public Instruction she has contributed to the elaboration of official curricula for French as a second language for elementary and secondary schools in Montenegro. She is a member of the examining board for DELF and DALF exams at the Institute of Foreign Languages in Montenegro.
